FORBES LIBRARY 2005 Annual Report 2005

FY05 Operating Budget

\$897,883 was appropriated by the City of Northampton for operating expenses, with an additional \$40,000 from investments and state aid grants.

The Operating Budget -- \$190,094

The Personnel Budget -- \$774,436

Clarke & Earle -- \$6,000

The FY05 Book Budget -- \$140,000

The budget for FY06 was very difficult. The 1.2% appropriation increase authorized by the City did not come close to covering the 6% increase in operating costs due to raises and inflation, and required cutting \$50,000 from the Library's budget. Funds in the Bisallion fund for local history (\$11,000), the Coolidge fund (\$28,000) and McCrillis fund (\$14,000) which were not designated for the permanent endowment, were used to pay personnel expenses in the CCPLM and Hampshire Room to help cover the shortfall.

Trustees

Russell Carrier was elected as President and Mary Harding as Vice President. Scott Morin was appointed Treasurer and Elizabeth Barone Secretary.

Joe Donohue, former president of the Friends of Forbes Library Board, was the recipient of the 2010 Trustees Award.

The Trustees set the target asset allocation mix in the Forbes endowment investment portfolio to 60% equities, 35% fixed income, and 5% cash. The trustees moved in the direction of the total return approach, allowing for the limited expenditure of principal to make up for the shortfall in cash distributions.

George Zimmerman, City Treasurer, presented the Trustees an overview of the library trust funds, the Pliney Earle and John Clarke Trusts. He explained that in 2004 the funds were moved from Morgan Stanley to Merrill Lynch and placed into separate accounts to make them easier to track. He also said that he was reactivating the City Trust Fund Committee to help oversee the funds and the committee will be developing an investment policy statement. Mr. Zimmerman said that he had instituted laddered CDs in 2004, which would help smooth out the returns on the funds.

The first bag of quarters was collected from the parking meters. Forbes agreed to pay \$5,000 per year to the City for the first 4 years. The Library obtained additional insurance coverage for the collection of the coins from the parking meters at a cost of \$70/year. Parking permits were given to staff, trustees, and volunteers who work at least eight hours per month. All others are expected to pay the meters.

Russell Carrier, Mary Harding, and Janet Moulding met with the Trustees of Lilly Library and both groups agreed that the two libraries needed to think creatively about library issues.

Lilly Library closed for renovation in the summer and 30 hours a week of Lilly's staff was shifted to the Forbes Library.

A fund raising committee consisting Mary Harding (Chair), Bonnie Burnham, Janet Moulding, Lisa Downing, a representative from the Friends of Forbes, a representative from the library staff, and members of the community was formed with the charge of establishing an annual fund, and secondarily to consider other fund raising ideas.

A volunteer appreciation tea was held on Tuesday, April 19th.

Renovations

Monaco Restorations, Inc. of Southborough, MA, was awarded the contract at a cost of \$189,000 for Phase I of the Repointing and Parking and Grounds Project. Ron Alex is the project architect and Jason Petcen is project overseer. The contractors doing the repointing of the building found serious problems with the mortar supporting the granite stones. Tests on the mortar samples sent to the chemist came back very weak, and when loose stones were removed, the mortar behind them had mostly disintegrated into sand. The architect on the project recommended that the library remove and completely reset the stones from the ground up to the first five feet of the building. The contractors worked through the winter by constructing a large structure in the parking lot to store the stones as they were removed from the building. It was essential that the stones were kept warm and dry or the mortar would not cure properly when stones were replaced. The outer granite stones were removed from the building and stored in the shed, and mortar was pumped into the interior wall. Stainless steel pins were inserted before the exterior stones were replaced and mortared in. The final pointing was scheduled for the spring. Titan Roofing was subcontracted for the roof installing snow guards and flashing by the gables.

The Community Development Block Grant of \$24,000 was received for the handicap lift replacement. The lowest bid on the Handicap Lift Project was \$29,800. The City of Northampton paid half (\$3,000), and the Friends of Forbes paid half of the library's share (\$1,500). The library paid the remaining \$1,500 with the annual payment of the Emerald City's lease of Old School Commons.

Operations

Circulation services at the Arts & Music Department were consolidated with the main floor circulation functions, so that all circulation transactions are done at the main desk. The merger freed up Arts & Music staff to devote more time to detailed inquiries from patrons and special collections work. As a result of Lilly Library staff working at Forbes while Lilly was closed for renovations, Forbes was open on Sunday afternoons. The opening of Forbes on Sunday required some reshuffling of hours, so that the library closed on Tuesday mornings.

Downloadable audio books through CWMars were added to the collection. A new car, a 10 year old Chrysler Concorde with 70,000 miles on it, was purchased for the Outreach service. The car cost \$1,200. Donation boxes were put in the Children's Room, Main Lobby, Coolidge Museum, and Arts & Music Department. The cost for the microfilm printouts was increased to 20 cents per page to cover maintenance costs for the microfilm reader printers. Nine librarians from the Kosova University and National Library visited Forbes Library on August 31 as part of a tour of American institutions to learn more about children's education. Although they could only communicate through a translator, they asked many questions and were very impressed by Forbes.

Museum Passes, a circulating collection which was instituted last year and financed by the Friends of Forbes, proved very popular with patrons. The museum passes circulated 218 times in the first 10 months of last year, and since many of them allowed families to enter, it was estimated that the passes admitted over 1,000 individuals to the museums.

The library continued to receive a few complaints from patrons about the parking meters. In response, the library designated a 10 minute parking space for book returns only. The library also created an all-day parking pass that patrons can purchase for \$3, so that they will not have to leave the building to feed the parking meter if they plan on spending a long time in the library. The passes are good only for the day indicated on the pass and only one pass can be purchased at a time.

The library installed an "open sign" above the front door that rolls up like a window shade. The sign has an off-white background with dark green letters. The total cost of the sign was \$620 including installation. Three banners were hung from the posts in the U-shaped walkway in front of the library. Produced by Downtown Decorations of Syracuse, NY, the banners including hardware cost \$585.

Signs were changed to create a staff only bathroom and a unisex bathroom on the mezzanine in place of the bathrooms formerly labeled for men or women.

Special Collections

Seventy-three Japanese prints which had been in the collection for many decades, but not well cared for, were auctioned on August 25 by the Robert C. Eldred Co. of East Dennis, MA. The sales netted \$19,683 which was used to restore the sixteen prints the library did not sell. Those are being restored by Geoffrey Oliver of Pittsford, NY.

A sterling silver punch bowl set and coffee/tea service originally aboard the SS Northampton was given to the library by the Clarke School.

Oriental rugs were purchased for the Hosmer Gallery and upstairs foyer. The total cost for the rugs was \$15,028, including a 20% discount from Candle in the Night in Brattleboro, VT.

Elliott Offner donated four sculptures to the Library for only the production costs. The foundry cost was \$4,900 for a large sculpture entitled Double Whale and \$5,400 for the large Swallow Tail Kite and \$1,300 for a small Cambridge Pheasant sculpture and \$1,200 for a bas relief of Sir Thomas More. Pedestals for the large sculptures were made by John Carlo Woodworking.

Antique clocks purchased from Ray Bates of Brattleboro, VT were installed February 24th. A large Seth Thomas was placed in the Reference Room and the English Dial clock with the convex face in the Reading Room. The small British George VI clock was hung the Director's office for security reasons.

Calvin Coolidge Presidential Library and Museum

Historic Northampton Director Kerry Buckley presented Historic Northampton's plan for a new facility composed of two wings, one for the current Historic Northampton collection and a second wing for the Calvin Coolidge collection. Mr. Buckley suggested that there was a window of opportunity to receive a congressional appropriation for the new facility, which is projected to cost \$7 million. However, funding did not materialize and the plan was dropped.

Children's Room

The children's room summer programs included storyteller Rona Leventhal, Rae Griffiths' Teaching Creatures, and storyteller Alicia Quintano.

Staff

Linda Knaack was President, Jason Petcen was Vice-President, Brian Tabor was Secretary, and Hillary Garrett was Treasurer of FLEA (Forbes Library Employee Association).

Don Finn resigned from the position of Clerk of the Works for the Parking and Grounds project.

Elise Bernier-Feeley retired June 30, 2005, as Head of Reference. She stayed on at the library as a part time local history librarian.

Charlotte Leighton, who started at the Forbes in 1987, and had worked for years at the circulation desk and since 2002 in Interlibrary Loan died in 2005.

Friends of Forbes

2005 was the twenty-fifth anniversary of the founding of the Friends of Forbes Library. Officers were Kari Knapp, President; Christine Nolan, Vice-President; Anne Keppler, Secretary; and Keirnan Murphy, Treasurer. Joe Donohoe and Dilman Doland retired from the board. There were two new members, Tim Umbach and Kregg Strehorn.

The Friends have 502 members, and received a \$1,000 Customer's Choice Community Grant award from the Florence Savings Bank. The Friends of Forbes annual garden tour raised over \$5,000.

The Friends gave \$800 for funding for an adult summer reading program, \$750 for children's summer programs, \$1,500 toward the Handicap Lift Project, and funding for the renewal of the museum passes. The Friends also gave \$822 for the purchase of puppets for the Children's Room and \$500 for the pre-school story time programming in the Children's Room.

Grants

Forbes Library received a \$6,000 grant from the Highland Valley Elder Care Services for the creation of an oral history initiative. The grant provided training and resources for patrons to create oral histories on a digital video format and provided a computer for senior citizen access to the internet and for the Kurzweil reading machine for the blind. Training was provided by Northampton Community Television and Clio Associates. The grant funded a new high-speed computer to handle video editing (\$2,200), a digital video camera for recording histories (\$1,500), training with Clio Associates (\$700), new books about recording life histories (\$500), and video editing software (\$500). Revan Schendler, oral history specialist at Smith College, agreed to be a mentor and designed and implemented the project.

The Northampton Arts Council awarded Forbes a grant for \$1,900 for the Forbes Film and Forum series of 20 nights of film programming. The NAC grant covered staff time, some material expenses and a small amount of advertising.
