INTRODUCTION

The "Hadley" series of the "Judd Manuscript" contains the material Judd gathered which is germane to the seventeenth and eighteenth-century history of Hadley, Massachusetts. It is in seven volumes, and is in his usual format, with the emphasis on local history and genealogical records. The title "Hadley" is somewhat misleading, however, as Judd also included items relevant to those towns closely associated with the early history of Hadley. Information on Hatfield is quite extensive, occupying a good portion of volumes I and II. Deerfield material is also present, virtually all in volume II, and South Hadley coverage is in volume VII. Except for a few references to Amherst, Granby, and Whatley, the other towns of the Connecticut River Valley do not receive much attention.

Of course, the material on Hadley itself is very abundant, and can be found scattered throughout the volumes, but is concentrated in volumes I, III, IV, and VI. Volume IV has a unique role. It is entitled "Hadley Genealogy," and in the microfilming of the "Manuscript" was included with the "Vital Statistics"

volumes, rather than the "Hadley" series. Judd, however, intended the genealogy volume to be part of the Hadley volumes, and the indexer has included the volume in this index, as well as in the "Vital Statistics" series index. A researcher who uses both the "Hadley" and the "Vital Statistics" indexes should expect to find duplication.

In addition to the previous general comments pertaining to general content, a few remarks about the format of the "Hadley" index are in order. Firstly, Massachusetts is assumed in all geographical references, and if another state is indicated, its name is included. Secondly, much of the material is genealogical in nature, and as in the "Vital Statistics" series, has been indexed by family name. To have included each individual mentioned would have produced a most unwieldy index. viduals who are included are those whom Judd indicated in his "Manuscript" were significant. Thirdly, a surname appears only once. No attempt has been made to differentiate among branches of a family or to distinguish different families with the same name. appear to be few examples of such multiple family names, but the user deserves to be forewarned that such a problem may exist. Finally, the family name entries have been assumed by the indexer to be genealogical in

nature, and "Genealogy" as a sub-entry has not been used. Where a sub-entry is not genealogical, the actual subject is identified.

In conclusion, a brief explanation of some of the generally used terms in this index is appropriate. Some of them are obvious and self-explanatory, others have been more arbitrarily assigned, and need an explanation, if the index and the "Manuscript" are to realize their full potential. The following terms will be found as separate main entries and as sub-entries under towns were applicable:

BIRTHS is an entry generally used to denote a list of individuals born, Judd's rendition of vital statistics. The parents' names are given, and siblings are usually listed together, and dates of birth are included.

BOUNDARIES is an entry which refers to some note made by Judd regarding the boundary location of a particular town, usually its determination as the result of some controversy.

CHURCH refers to material relevant to the church as a congregation or as a building. It does not include references to the minister.

CLERGY is the entry used to refer to the minister, having to do with his appointment and support, as well as his activities.

DEATHS is an entry used to indicate a list of those who died, and is usually organized by year of death. Like Births, it may be a copy of vital statistics.

EDUCATION is an entry which pertains to the schools of a particular town, especially as it relates to their financing.

FOUNDING is an entry which refers to the establishment of the town, to include such things as the founding covenant and its signers, or a petition regarding the establishment of a particular town.

GENEALOGY is a catchall entry used where one of the more specific genealogical entries is not applicable. The "Manuscript" items are usually brief notes, without unifying principle. Judd's terms were sometimes "people" or "families."

INDIANS is an entry covering Indian affairs in a town, usually relating to the sale of land by the Indians to the town or its residents.

INHABITANTS refers to a variety of "Manuscript" items which are lists of the residents of a specific town, and dated after its founding. The lists may be petitioners to the General Court, a list of assigned seats in the meeting house, or a list of a town's "proprietors."

LAND CONTRACTS is an entry referring to the purchase and sale of land by individuals. A number of transactions are usually grouped together in the "Manuscript."

LAND GRANTS is an entry used to indicate a list of the individual recipients or owners of land in the "division" of a particular field.

LAND HOLDINGS is an entry used to specify lists of individual residents with their collected land holdings. The entries are organized by individual owners rather than by field.

MARRIAGES is an entry used to identify lists of marriages. Both individuals are generally included, and occasionally children of the union are mentioned.

PROBATE RECORDS is an entry which denotes Judd's summation of wills and inventories, and usually includes the names of the decedent's survivors. It is a supplement to, rather than a substitute for, the Deaths entry.

ROADS is an entry which deals with the laying out or maintenance of the streets of a particular town.

Occasionally there is a reference to an inter-town road or colony road.

TAXATION is an entry referring to lists of property assessments made in individual towns, usually including the name of the owner, the value of the property, and the specific tax.
