## INTRODUCTION

In the 1830's and 1840's, Sylvester Judd made trips to a number of Connecticut towns, where he copied or made notes on items relative to the colonial history of those towns, and devoted considerable effort to similar activities among the state archives in Hartford. When finished, he had collected ten volumes of material which can be separately identified as the "Connecticut" series in Judd's broader sixty-four volume "Manuscript." Unfortunately, Judd followed no perceivable system of organization in his labors, and what he left has generally been difficult to use. Where to find usable information on a specific topic has been impossible to determine. The following subject index is an attempt to remedy that situation.

So that the index may direct the user to available material quickly and easily, it is desirable for the indexer to explain his principles of organization and the usage of certain terms. The essence of the following index is that it follows Judd's own ideas regarding the place, importance, or relevance of the material. In his own work Judd was essentially a local historian and genealogist, and this viewpoint is evident in his "Manuscript." Most of the material in the "Connecticut" series is noted under the name of the relevant community, and the indexer has followed that Wherever possible, items have been primarily system. indexed under a town's name, although cross-references from the major subdivisions within the towns have been included to assist the user. Thus for example, "Probate records," of which there are many, is a sub-entry for those towns where it is applicable, and can also be found as a main entry, including references to general probate matters and a list of the towns which have "Probate records" as a sub-entry.

A second major aspect of the "Connecticut" series is material relevant to individuals, much of it recorded by Judd in the form of birth, death, and marriage lists. It must be stressed, however, that not all of the thousands of names Judd entered in his "Manuscript" are To have attempted such an effort would indexed here. have precluded completion of the index. Those individuals who are included in the index are those who received special consideration by Judd, as evidenced by his having given them a separate page or section in his notes, or in some way indicating that he regarded them as significant. Those individuals who appear, however, only as names on a list, whether they be signers of a petition, holders of land in a given field, or simply have their birth or marriage recorded are not included in the index. er looking for a particular individual not listed in the index will find that individual, if he or she was included by Judd, only by using the genealogically oriented entries which are discussed at the end of this introduction. "Births," "Deaths," and "Marriages" are obvious areas to investigate, but Judd was also interested in recording individual land holdings, and thus many individuals are listed in those entries germane to land ownership.

Note should also be made that in addition to local history and genealogy, Judd was very much interested in the American Revolution, especially its economic aspects. In volume six of the series, he included much material relevant to Connecticut in the Revolution. That material is included in the index.

On the broadest scope, the user of the following index should be aware that, unless otherwise indicated, all entries relate to Connecticut, and thus the name of the state has been omitted except where necessary to clarify an entry or sub-entry. It should also be noted that all entries are from the ten volumes of the "Manuscript" designated as the "Connecticut" series, and that the Roman numerals in the index refer only to volume numbers in that series.\* The consequence of indexing only the "Connecticut" series is that material in other volumes of the "Manuscript" relevant to Connecticut have not been included. This omission is especially vexing concerning volume six of the "Miscellaneous" series, which contains some useful Connecticut references. Eventually all the series in the "Manuscript" will be integrated into a single index, but until that project is completed, the indexer asks the user's forebearance and understanding.

Because of the minuteness and individuality of Judd's local and genealogical point of view, and his inconsistent labeling, much of what he included does not fit into an easily indexed format. It has therefore been necessary to select certain terms, which, while they are not Judd's, describe the contents of the "Connecticut" series in ways that it is hoped will be useful and helpful. Some of them are obvious and selfexplanatory, others have been more arbitrarily assigned, and need an explanation if the index and the "Manuscript" are to realize their full potential. The following terms will be found both as separate main entries and as subentries under the towns wherever applicable:

BIRTHS is an entry generally used to denote a list of individuals born, possibly Judd's rendition of

the town's vital statistics. Often the parents' names are given, and siblings are usually listed together. The date of birth is also usually included.

BOUNDARIES is an entry which refers to some note made by Judd regarding the boundary location of a particular town, usually its determination as the result of some controversy.

CHURCH refers to material relevant to the church as a congregation or as a building. It does not include references to the minister.

CLERGY is the entry used to refer to the minister, having to do with his appointment and support, as well as his activities.

DEATHS is an entry used to indicate a list of those who died, and is usually organized by year of death. Like Births, it may be a copy of vital statistics.

FOUNDING is an entry which refers to the establishment of the town, to include such things as the founding covenant and its signers, or a petition regarding the establishment of a particular town.

GENEALOGY is a catchall entry used where one of the more specific genealogical entries is not applicable. The "Manuscript" items are usually brief notes, without unifying principle. Judd's terms were sometimes "people" or "families."

INHABITANTS refers to a variety of "Manuscript" items which are lists of the residents of a specific town, and dated after its founding. The lists may be petitioners to the General Court, a list of assigned seats in the meeting house, or a list of a town's "proprietors."

INDIANS is an entry covering Indian affairs in a town, usually relating to the sale of land by the Indians to the town or its residents.

JUDD VISIT refers to a visit or visits made by Judd to the town while collecting material for the

"Manuscript." The "Manuscript" item most often includes when Judd was in the community and his obversations about it.

LAND CONTRACTS is an entry referring to the purchase and sale of land by individuals. A large number of transactions are usually grouped together in the "Manuscript."

LAND GRANTS is an entry used to indicate a list of the individual recipients or owners of land in the "division" of a particular field. Judd usually identified such lists by the name of the field, such as the Hartford item "Lots in Westfield."

LAND HOLDINGS is an entry used to specify lists of individual residents with their collected land holdings. The entries are organized by individual owners, and differ distinctly from the previous term. "Wethersfield Homelots" and "Waterbury Lands 1687" are examples of this latter entry.

MARRIAGES is an entry used to identify lists of marriages. Both individuals are generally included, and occasionally children of the union are mentioned.

OFFICIAL RECORDS is an entry which is used to locate those few instances where Judd did not follow his usual practice of digesting and grouping material under a specific topic, but merely summarized the official records or minutes of the town meetings.

PROBATE RECORDS is an entry which denotes Judd's summation of wills and inventories, and usually includes the names of the decedent's survivors. The notes are often in chronological order. It is not a substitute for the Deaths entry, but a supplement to it.

TAXATION is an entry referring to lists of property assessments made in individual towns, usually including the name of the owner, the value of the property, and the specific tax.

Among the other sub-entries occasionally found under a town, but not extensive enough to warrant cross references, are two which need a brief explanation.
"Fences" is used to denote references to fence erection and repairs within the town, and is not necessarily linked with either the town's boundaries or inhabitants' land holdings. "Roads" refers to the building and maintenance of roads within the town. Inter-town and inter-colonial roads are found under a separate "Roads" entry in the index.

Finally, a brief note about the sub-entries used with personal entries in the index. Some, like "Land," "Marriage," or "Lawsuit" are self-explanatory; others are The "Death" sub-entry is used to include any reference to the death of the individual, including the actual death, and any material relevant to the probating of the estate, such as a will or inventory. The descendants of the individual are also quite often mentioned. ogy" is a sub-entry which covers any reference to the family of the individual, including ancestors and descendants. Where only the surname is given by Judd or where he included a number of individuals with the same surname together in the "Manuscript," that surname with "family" added to it will be found following the specific individuals with that surname.
