Today marks the centennial of the 1924 election

After becoming President in 1923 following President Harding's death, on November 4, 1924 Calvin Coolidge won re-election to his own term!

Presidents Book Group


Presidents Book Group meets on the 4th Monday of the month at 6:30 PM This hybrid group meets in person in the Coolidge Museum or join via zoom

November 25 we will discuss President Polk


A Country of Vast Designs: James K. Polk, the Mexican War, and the Conquest of the American Continent by Robert W. Merry runs about 470 pages and available in print

Living My Life



This month in Coolidge History

Rebecca the Raccoon arrived at the White House



During the Coolidge years there was a pet raccoon named Rebecca in the White House. She was sent as a gift intended to be served for Thanksgiving Dinner in 1926 but instead was kept by the Coolidge family as a pet. She roamed the residential quarters of the White House, had an outdoor play house and was walked on a leash on the grounds. She appeared in Mrs. Coolidge arms and on a leash at the 1927 Easter Egg Roll and went to the Summer White House in Black Hills, South Dakota for the summer of 1927. In 1929 she did not return with the family to Northampton, Massachusetts and was sent to Rock Creek Park (National Zoo).
